When putting English into Latin, you have several things to consider:

- 1. Form: what form will you need for each word (Syntax packet!)
- 2. Vocabulary: what Latin words will you be using
- 3. Word order: try to maintain typical Latin word order

Form:

- Subject
- Direct Object
- Verb
 - o Person
 - o Number
 - o Tense
 - Mood
 - Voice
- Indirect Object
- Possession
- Prepositional Phrases
- Direct address
- Predicate Nominatives

Vocabulary:

- The Vocab sheets will be your best friend
- Try to choose the best word for what the sentence is saying

Word Order:

- Latin Word Order Rules
 - 1. Subject is first (unless a question or no nominative subject)
 - 2. Modifiers to subject come next (adjectives going with subject)
 - 3. Indirect object and any modifiers
 - 4. Direct object and any modifiers
 - 5. Complementary infinitives
 - 6. Adverbs
 - 7. Verb
- Placement of Adjectives:
 - 1. Typically after the noun they modify
 - 2. Exceptions:
 - Size adjectives (e.g. parvus and magnus)
 - Number adjectives (e.g. multi and pauci)
 - When you want to emphasize the adjective
- Genitives are usually after the nouns they modify
 - 1. This is because they act like adjectives
- Placement of Prepositional phrases
 - 1. Often before the complementary infinitive (after direct object)
 - 2. Placement is freer, depending on what the author wants to emphasize
- Placement of Predicate Nominatives
 - 1. May be before or after the verb "to be" (writer's choice)
